# Charleston Combat Camera Reunion Recap

USAF Combat Camera's 2016 Annual Reunion is now in the history books! This year's reunion was another outstanding event hosted by Renée Tyron and the 1st Combat Camera Squadron. Of the more than 100 past and present Combat Camera veterans and guests who attended the various events, nearly 50 were first-time reunion attendees. As an added twist, the reunion this year was held in conjunction with the 1 CTCS's first "Combat Camera Shoot-off" workshop.

Thanks to Hurricane Matthew, the workshop got off to a slow and rocky start but also provided the shoot-off participants with a real-world event to capture in the Charleston Low Country. 1 CTCS' resident photojournalist (and former Navy Combat Camera), Clarence Brown, mentored four young and talented teams of photojournalists and broadcasters from the 1Combat Camera Squadron, 1 Special Operations Wing and the 27 Special Operations Wing. The 2016 reunion kicked off on Thursday, Oct 13th with an amazing ice breaker reception at the Embassy Suites in Charleston with a Baron of Beef, Old Bay seasoned shrimp, smoked fish, grilled harvest vegetables, assorted cheeses and bread, and a fruit display with chocolate sauce. Very Cool!

Lastly, the 1st recently organized an array of legacy items they've been collecting or inherited over the years and now have it on display in their newly inaugurated Squadron Heritage Room. We definitely envied their shiny display cases filled with relics from our past. (BTW, we are still collecting for our future museum displays!) After our tour, we took our annual group photo in front of the C-141 at the Joint Base Charleston Air Park, followed by an evening in the hospitality suite filled with tales of past escapades and adventures which grow more fantastic every year.
